### 3312 ROBINSON AVENUE HOUSE DEMOLISHED A SECOND TIME

The original house at 3312 Robinson Avenue was demolished by a developer to make room to build two new houses on the property. In the process, the developer built the new front house in violation of the front yard setback rule which states that




development is not allowed in the 25-foot minimum front yard setback area. This code violation prompted the City to issue a "red tag hold" stop work order on the project, and subsequently the developers' request for a variance of the zoning code.

On October 10th, the City's Board of Adjustment (BOA) heard arguments by the developer for getting the variance from the setback 25 foot minimum. The developers argued that 45% of the properties in the University Park Subdivision where the project is located do not adhere to the setback code, and therefore, they should be allowed to violate the code by act of precedent. However, they did not present a convincing enough argument or evidence to substantiate the claim to the satisfaction of the BOA.

The Board moved to grant a one month postponement of the case to allow the developers time to produce evidence of their claim by having professional surveys completed for the properties offered as proof of precedent. This motion passed by unanimous vote. For the Board to grant a variance to building code, the requestor is required to prove a "hardship" that is unique to the property in question. During the hearing in this case, the Board Chair commented, "I have a hard time finding a hardship on this."

In the City Hall lobby after the hearing, the developers offered to negotiate with the CNA to reach a solution that would allow the building to stand. Instead of negotiating this, however, the developers demolished the house they had just built two days



after the hearing, on the morning of October 13th and subsequently, they withdrew their request for a variance. On October 14th, the developers submitted an updated site plan showing the house in compliance with the 25-foot front yard setback. It should be noted that the 2nd house on the property is under a separate permit and it is not on HOLD by the City. 

### CITY THEATRE COMPANY CELEBRATES 11 TH SEASON

The City Theatre Company is excited to be celebrating its 11th anniversary of live theatre in Austin. Located on Airport Road at 38th Street, the theatre is a not for profit sponsored in part by the Austin Creative Alliance and the Austin Cultural Arts Division. It was founded in 2006 and has been recognized by the Austin Critics Table Awards, the B. Iden Payne Awards, the Central Texas Excellence in Theatre Awards, and Austin Live

Theatre. They were voted Best Theatre Company twice by Austin American Statesman's Austin 360. City Theatre's Founder and Artistic Director Andy Berkovsky was honored as Best Director in 2015 by the Central Excellence in Live Theatre Awards. In his words, the City Theatre Company is dedicated in providing quality theatrical experiences for Austin artists and our community. We are committed to making productions accessible to everyone.

FLEA: Longevity in theatre is admirable. How have you sustained the theatre company for over 10 years?

ANDY: It's been tough. We are a theatre company, but we also have a venue we offer to other groups and part of our income comes from guest productions. We are fortunate to have a space that we can call our own. We schedule matinee performances on Sunday, leaving Sunday evening open for improve groups and musical guests. If a yoga class wants to use the space or another theatre company needs rehearsal space, we can often accommodate them. We don't own the space, so we need to be creative in how we use it to sustain the company.

FLEA: I notice that you produce a wide variety of theatre. How do you choose your season?

ANDY: A lot of research. I like to mix it up. We consider ourselves a commercial theatre. We might throw in a work by a new playwright or a show that hasn't been done previously, but 80 to 90 percent of our shows are mainstream popular plays and classics. I consider myself fairly well read and I have an advisory committee. As we move into each new season, we toss out titles and see what sticks. The final selection for each season is most definitely, a collaborative effort.

FLEA: How do you see Austin as a theatre city?

ANDY: There is a solid audience for commercial plays in Austin. Many people haven't seen productions of, say, Glass Menagerie or Twelve Angry Men. Such scripts have enduring value and we can afford the royalties to stage them. Producing a one-month run of a new script can run \$1,500 to \$2,000 just for royalties, that isn't possible for many theatre groups. On the other hand, many classics

are royalty-free. I think our selections fill a gap not served by other Austin theatres.

FLEA: This is a relatively small theatre.

ANDY: Yes, it is and to some degree, the size limits the scope of our productions. What we offer is intimate theatre experience. Streetcar Named Desire, in one of the larger theatres, is a different, perhaps less visceral, experience than seeing it up-close on a smaller stage.

FLEA: How has the growth of the Mueller area affected City Theatre?

ANDY: When we found this location, there was no theatre happening on the east side of Austin. In fact, there was relatively no audience. Since then, we have built an audience and the Mueller development brings thousands of potential theatre goers.

FLEA: You wear many hats.

ANDY: True, from Producer to Director to Manager

to Publicist, and even Janitor. FLEA: What is your goal?

ANDY: Our goal is to put a little theatre in your life!






### Crimes of the Heart by Beth Henley

### KEEPING THEM HOME 4 PAWS AT A TIME

The holidays are coming. Everyone is making their lists and a certain someone is checking them twice. Here is an important checklist, especially during the holidays when pets have greater opportunities to escape. Take precautions to reduce the chances your pet will go missing, as well as increase chances of a reunion. A missing pet can be devastating.

Provide multiple IDs, the more IDs the better. Confirm IDs are securely attached to collar (rabies tag, microchip, and descriptive tags). **TIP:** Create a tag to communicate certain conditions e.g. "If I'm outside, I'm lost" or "I'm not abused, just afraid". For collars, two fingers should fit underneath the collar for proper fit. A Martingale collar is popular for its 2 loop feature that prevents a dog from choking or backing out of the collar. **TIP:** Add your name and phone number with permanent pen on the collar.

- Register microchips
- Evaluate tracking systems
- Pinpoint potential escape routes
- Assemble a lost pet kit
- Kead expert advice from Missing Pet Partnership
- Employ calming methods

Register microchips. To check if your pet's microchip is registered you can have them scanned at the vet. The Banfield Hospital inside PetsMart off Barbara Jordan can scan pets for microchips. You can also check www. petmicrochiplookup.org. Further ensure a reunion if a pet is brought to the Austin Animal Center by emailing your pet's chip number and description to Animal.customerservice@austintexas.gov for inclusion in their database.

If your pet is an escape artist, evaluate pet tracking systems. Radio trackers use older technology without a subscription fee and cost \$200-\$1000. GPS trackers track a pet's current and historical journey and cost \$99-\$250. Take into consideration: size, waterproof, battery, method of attachment, distance and coverage. The greater the range, the higher the cost will be.

Assemble a lost pet kit, including photos of both sides of your pet, full body and head close-ups, unusual markings or features, and their collar and tags.
