Upper Boggy Creek Neighborhood Plan 20th Anniversary


n the late-1990's the City of Austin invested great time and effort in small-area, neighborhood planning in the urban core of the city. By 2000, the process had reached our area with more than 100 people attending a first meeting, "the largest group ever to attend a kick-off meeting." After a two-year process, over 40 meetings, and two major surveys, the Upper Boggy Creek Neighborhood Plan (UBCNP) was adopted by City Council in August 2002.

A total of six neighborhood areas are included in the UBCNP area – Blackland, Cherrywood, Delwood II, Rogers Washington Holy-Cross, Scheiffer-Willowbrook, and Wilshire Wood/Delwood I. This area encompasses almost the entirety of the 78722 zip code.


The UBCNP Vision statement rings as true today as it did 20 years ago, "The Upper Boggy Creek Neighborhood Planning Area seeks to be an attractive, human-scaled, pedestrian- and cyclist-oriented group of neighborhoods. The neighborhoods also seek to limit commercial encroachment into residential areas, reduce the negative effects of traffic, enhance the physical and environmental beauty, and preserve and enhance the existing unique character of each distinct neighborhood."

A team of volunteer neighborhood stakeholders led the effort, almost 40 individuals are listed in the plan itself as core members. While the community has lost several of those early leaders, many still live in the Upper Boggy Creek area and are still very active in shaping our community.

The team established six goals related to Community Character, Land Use, Housing, Transportation, Parks/Open Space/Environment, and Services. Each goal is broken into specific objectives to be pursued through 114 action items that detail which City Department should take lead on implementation.

I-35 Update

December 2021 and January 2022 were not only busy months in the I-35 CapEx Central timeline, they have also proven to be turning points in the conversation.

In December, the City of Austin (CoA) rolled out the "Austin Cap & Stitch Project," its first public foray into the discussion I-35 improvements. Billed as "a community-centered plan to build infrastructure over I-35 that connects downtown, improves mobility, and provides community amenities," the video and survey focus attention on the possibility for building deck plazas—or caps—over I-35 between 12th and 11th Streets and between 8th and Cesar $\,$ Chavez Streets. Although not directly impacting the Cherrywood neighborhood, the capping shown in the city's proposal hinted at what we would see in TxDOT's design alternatives, scheduled to be made public in late January.

Because the CoA's plan effectively confirmed that capping was not being explored in the Cherrywood section and knowing that our neighborhood is in the crosshairs of significant right-of-way expansion, the Cherrywood Neighborhood Association decided to turn up its advocacy efforts, and especially focus on reaching city officials. CNA began to draft a letter expressing our disappointment that city representatives and elected officials would turn a blind eye to highway expansion in Austin's urban core neighborhoods while offering significant and well-articulated alternatives that would allow TxDOT to fulfill its promise of "no wider" and for CoA to do right by its urban core residents.

As anticipated, TxDOT issued significantly redesigned alternatives showing extensive capping south of 8th Street. In Cherrywood, the alternatives show stitches—widened bridges—around Dean



Keeton, 32nd, and 38 D, as well as new areas of "potential enhanced aesthetic opportunity" (PEAO). Although the updated alternatives show TxDOT and CoA taking steps in the right direction, CNA is not satisfied. The modified alternatives still show Cherrywood businesses and residents bearing the brunt of highway widening and not even for the benefit of a fully covered roadway. We are also unconvinced of the value of the stitches or PEAOs to neighborhood residents. On January 28, CNA issued its formal response to CoA and to TxDOT telling them to do and how to do better. We will continue to call for capping I-35 between Dean Keeton and at least 38 D Street, if not all the way north to Airport. Please watch the listserv or the CNA Facebook page for announcements of upcoming meetings regarding the I-35 CapEx Central project. Increased neighborhood engagement in 2022 will be critical to achieving the best possible outcome for Cherrywood.

Registration is Open for Maplewood Elementary

Welcome to all incoming Maplewood Mustang Families!

THE FACTS:

Established in 1951, Maplewood Elementary is your local public elementary school serving families in Cherrywood, parts of Mueller, and is also open to transfer students from anywhere in Austin. Maplewood is a diverse community of learners in Pre-K through 5th grade. Pre-K students must be four, and Kindergarteners must be five, by September 1st. The school day runs from 7:40 a.m.-3:10 p.m. On-site after school care is available until 6 p.m. from a variety of vendors including Creative Action. In spring 2022, there are approximately 420 students enrolled at Maplewood. Parent volunteer support on campus is welcomed and encouraged!

WHY MAPLEWOOD?

Maplewood teachers are a mix of veterans and new educators. While 15 teachers and teaching assistants are in their first five years at our school, 10 have been teaching more than 5 years, and 15 have been at our campus for more than 10 years, including six leaders who have been with Maplewood for more than 20 years. About 25% of our students are enrolled in the dual-language program (Spanish). Our Special Areas Team (music, art, physical education, and library) is phenomenal. Students are presented with an engaging and challenging arts curriculum and participate in school-wide arts events celebrating cultural diversity (e.g. Latinx Heritage Night and Black History Month). Our P.E. coach leads our students in an innovative fitness program including units like cardio drumming; she was just named one of five finalists for 2022 National Teacher of the Year for Elementary Physical Education.

Maplewood boasts a school-wide Social Emotional Learning and "Increase the Peace" program led by our fabulous school counselor. We have been recognized as a longstanding No Place for Hate campus. In 2020, our school counselor started a Reading Against Racism Program for both students and parents. Our parent community shows up and is not afraid to talk about hard things! The theme of increasing the peace is embedded in the fabric of our school. Maplewood has a Peace Pole garden in the back and a Peace sign sculpture at our front entrance. Individual students are nominated by staff and recognized as "Peace Makers" each week. All of our Kindergarten and Pre-K students participate in a Mindfulness program with a certified yoga/mindfulness instructor who is a former Maplewood classroom teacher.

Maplewood values outdoor education and environmental stewardship. Many of our students eat lunch outdoors every day or learn in one of our "outdoor classroom" areas on campus. The National Wildlife Federation has recognized Maplewood as an Eco Rise School and a Monarch Heroes School. In addition to our Pollinator Gardens, each classroom has its own vegetable garden and we have a school orchard. We have been the recipients of several Bright Green Futures Grants, most recently a 2021 grant to support composting and recycling at outdoor lunch. Two new playscapes were installed by AISD this winter, and we also just received a grant from Austin Public Health to enhance our recess spaces with new blacktop and sidewalk activity paint and new soccer goals.

Primary Election: February 2022

Another election year is upon us, and the Democratic and Republican party primaries are fast approaching. Election day is March 1, with the early voting period running from Feb. 14 to Feb 25. And an application for a mail-in ballot must be received by the Travis County Clerk by Feb. 18.

You won't find candidates for our nonpartisan city council on this ballot. Those elections will be held during the general election in November. You also won't find candidates for the Green or Libertarian parties, as those parties hold conventions to nominate their candidates instead of primary elections.

What you will find this year is an extremely busy and crowded primary cycle for Texas' main statewide elected offices, as well as nominations for Travis County officials and our state senator and state representative. As one of fifteen "open primary" states, registered Texas voters may vote in any one of the parties' primary without registering as a member of that party, though you can only vote in a party's primary runoff election if you voted in that party's primary earlier that year.

At the top of the ticket, the Governor's race has five candidates vying for the Democratic nomination and, somewhat unusually for an established incumbent, seven intraparty challengers to our sitting Republican governor. There are similarly crowded races for Lt. Governor (3 Ds, 6 Rs), Attorney General (5 Ds, 4 Rs), Land Commissioner (4 Ds, 8Rs), Ag Commissioner (2 Ds, 3Rs), and Comptroller (3Ds, 2 Rs). There also are contests for a Railroad Commissioner seat and several places on the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals and the Texas Supreme Court.

Due to the redistricting process, new electoral maps were drawn for U.S. Congress, the State Board of Education, and the Texas Senate and House. For the most part, our districts have remained effectively the same. We are still represented by SBOE District 5, with the incumbent running in the Democratic party with two challengers, and the Republican contest with two candidates. And our current state senator Sarah Eckhardt and state representative Sheryl Cole both are running unopposed in their primaries.

But the biggest impact of redistricting on our neighborhood is to move us from U.S. Congressional District 25, a Republican-leaning district that included just a small piece of Austin, to a newly drawn Congressional District 37 based almost entirely in the city and its immediate surrounding area. In redistricting lingo, Austin had been "cracked" into several disparate districts to dilute our collective political power. Because the 2020 census resulted in Texas gaining two new congressional seats, lawmakers chose to "pack" most of Austin into one of the new districts to retain a political advantage elsewhere. Congressman Lloyd Doggett, who left our previous district for another when ours was drawn to advantage a Republican in 2011, has again switched districts to run in our new one, alongside three other challengers in the Democratic primary. There are three candidates running in the Republican primary.

Recent legislation passed by the state legislature made several changes to the voting process, especially to the mail-in ballot process. The new law bans drive-thru voting, prohibits 24-hour voting, and increases the number of required early voting hours in smaller counties to match those already required of larger counties. Election officials may no longer send out mail-in ballot applications unless they are requested by the voter. Partisan poll watchers were granted more autonomy to oversee voting, matched with additional required train-

ing and stronger accountability for poll watchers who violate state law while at a polling location.

Those voting by mail, which is still restricted only to those who are 65 or older, who will be out of the country during the election, are confined to jail, or have a disability or illness that prevents them from voting in person, must now include their driver's license or social security number on their mail-in ballot and application, and that information must match their voting record. While potentially an upgrade on the current process of matching signatures, implementation this year has been marred with problems, and many applications have been rejected as a result. A new online ballot tracker is meant to empower voters to correct problems with their application or their ballot during an election. Every Cherrywood resident should exercise their right to vote. Not only is it the most direct way to participate in our democracy, but the greater the number of our residents who vote, the more visibility we will have when voicing our collective opinions to our local elected officials throughout their terms. Historically, voter turnout in Precinct 152, which includes all of the Cherrywood, Scheiffer-Willowbrook, and Wilshire Wood neighborhoods, has exceeded the statewide voter turnout and even edged out turnout in Travis County as a whole (for the Nov. 2020 election, these rates were 72.5%, 66.7%, and 70.5%, respectively). Let's see if we can increase our turnout even more in


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
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


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
