Get Out the Vote

As we are all likely well aware by now, Tuesday, Nov 8 is another Election Day. With our busy lives, we can sometimes feel like our vote doesn't have much impact, especially compared to other responsibilities. But nothing could be further from the truth. November's outcomes will affect everything from healthcare to education to our judiciary.

Regardless of your political affiliation or stance on national issues, a high voter turnout (meaning the percentage of eligible voters in an area who actually cast a ballot) at the neighborhood level can positively affect our influence with state representatives and on City Hall.

All of Cherrywood will vote in the open mayoral race from among six (six!) candidates. Most of Cherrywood is in Austin City Council District 9, which is crowded with eight (eight!) candidates on the ballot. Several streets just north of Manor Rd, west of Cherrywood Rd are now in District 1 and have four candidates to choose from. Check out the Aug 2022 Flea newsletter (www.cherrywood.org/newsletter) for more background on neighborhood redistricting.

Also, with the mayoral and District 9 races being crowded, there's a good chance one or both races will end up in a run-off between the top two vote earners. Voter turnout at the neighborhood level is massively important in

local run-off elections. Circle your calendar now for the likely Dec 13 City of Austin Runoff Election Day.

Over the last several years, Cherrywood has well out-paced the city-wide turnout in general and in mid-term elections:

- 2020 72.5% City-wide 66.7%
- 2018 71.4% City-wide 61.5%
- 2016 70.6% City-wide 64.6%
- 2014 55.2% City-wide 40.4%

In-person early voting is the most convenient way to vote, and runs from Oct. 24 to Nov. 4. You can vote at any of the early voting locations across Travis County Monday through Saturday, 7 a.m. to 7 p.m., and Sunday, noon to 6 p.m. On Saturday, Oct. 29, and Friday, Nov. 4, five voting "megacenters" will be open from 7 a.m. to 9 p.m. – check out this web page for locations, a handy app that shows wait times at different locations, and a sample ballot for our area—www.votetravis.com.

The closest early voting locations to Cherrywood are:

- Austin Energy Headquarters at 4815 Mueller Blvd
- LBJ School of Public Affairs at 2315 Red River St
- Millennium Youth Complex at 1156 Hargrave St (megacenter)
- Carver Branch Library at 1161 Angelina St

On Election Day, Tuesday, Nov 8, the closest polling location will be Genesis Presbyterian Church at 1507 Wilshire Blvd adjacent to Patterson Park – walking distance for most of Cherrywood!


Statewide races include: Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, Railroad Commissioner, Agriculture Commissioner, and three Texas Supreme Court Justices.

City races include: Mayor (a city-wide position), City Council members (by district), and several large bond proposals for local entities and initiatives (including Austin Independent School Board, City of Austin affordable housing, and Austin Community College).

The League of Women Voters' Vote 411 guide (www.vote411.org) is a great place to start to quickly get information on candidates and their positions. Enter your address and a list of candidates and propositions will pop up, along with high-level info. From there visit the candidates' web pages to drill down more detail. Reach out to their offices and ask them questions. They need to hear from you!

Once you've got your notes, print out a personalized ballot at www.votetravis.com and take it with you to the polls.

Visit votetexas.gov, where you can see if you're registered to vote and find details about voting with disabilities.



Falling for Election Season

As we pull together another Flea, the first honest cool weather has arrived. Seems later than usual, but many things feel overdue these days – except the suddenly earlier sunsets. We'll be back in-person for our next General Meeting, which is also our Annual Meeting when we for Austin City Council districts. Please see the August Flea online for elect new Steering Committee members (see page six) and thank those more background on this change. who are rolling off. Please come out, whatever the weather!

We cancelled the August General Meeting, so it's been a while since we last met in early June! In support of ongoing advocacy for a better future I-35 design on our western edge to the City of Austin and Texas Dept of Transportation, we'll be restarting our Land Use/ Transportation Committee meetings on the first Wed of every month to focus on I-35 and other issues (see the recap of Steering Committee $discussion with Anna \, Martin \, of the \, Austin \, Transportation \, Department$ on page 3). Tune in to the Cherrywood NA listsery for more details.

This past August provided a Fifth Sunday (and Mon through Wed!) and several informal gatherings were held around the neighborhood. Halloween weekend is also a Fifth Sunday - the next opportunity comes in January. Check out the August 2022 Flea newsletter for a bit more on this neighborhood connection idea.

In September we held a forum at Cherrywood Center for candidates running for the open District 9 seat, as well as for the open mayoral seat. We had a great turnout, with about 50 residents at the peak. Four of the D9 candidates spoke or submitted answers to questions – Linda Guerrero, Ben Leffler (a Cherrywood resident!), Greg Smith, Joah Spearman, Zo Qadri, and Tom Wald (also a Cherrywood resident!). We also had the two leading mayoral candidates: Celia Israel and Kirk Watson. We weren't able to get to all the questions residents wanted to ask, but thank you for the great turnout!

This Flea is being timed to arrive before Election Day on Tue, Nov. 8. The cover story outlines why it's important to get out to vote, the

closest most convenient locations for voting, and other key information for Election Day. Those Cherrywooders on the southern edge of the neighborhood have been redistricted from District 9 to District 1

At our November meeting we'll be electing new Steering Committee members; see page six for more. We'll also review City election results and what they may mean for neighborhood agency and issues, updates on the I-35 project, and the third annual Cherrywood holiday fundraising campaign - this year to benefit both Maplewood and Campbell Elementary Schools; see page seven for more. We're also trying to secure an Austin Police Department representative to share any information on the spate of gunshots heard over several days in early October in the Manor Rd, Banton to Walnut area.

And I want to give a special thank you to Brandy Savarese, who is rolling off the Steering Committee and moving to a cooler locale. She brought a high energy and insight to the neighborhood's approach to the I-35 project, and we'll miss her! We look forward to inviting her back to help open the North Central Deck park in a few years ...

It's been a great fall at the park. There have been several fun community gatherings, including a field day with the Cab City Cobra softball team, a National Night Out picnic co-hosted by the Cherrywood NA, and the Fall Festival at the community garden.

The Fall Festival was part of the Roots & Wings Festival happening around the city, and included a sensory scavenger hunt in the garden, butterflies, bats, bee keeping, composting and tree planting demonstrations, live music, and pumpkin decorating. Fall in Central Texas is magical, and this has become a favorite annual event at the park.

Two big news items are that the Pharr Tennis Center renovation is underway and moving faster than expected. Melissa Knight and Rakhee Jain, the artists creating a piece that will be part of the project, think they might be installing it later this winter. Also, as the first part of the Neighborhood Partnering Program grant, the new youth baskets and backboards at the basketball court are in. New benches, limestone seating, and trash and recycling receptacles will be installed before the end of the year. The final piece of the grant, the shade structure over the basketball court, is still in the design phase. We can't wait to see how the park looks by the time spring rolls around!

Artist Takeover

Muralist and visual artist Zuzu Perkal and a group of 35+ artists are doing an artist takeover of a soon-to-be demolished duplex site off Manor Rd.(near the old EastSide Café/new Este) that will be open to the public for the East Austin Studio Tour in November.

"HERE TODAY, GONE TOMORROW" is an artist-run collaborative visual journey that speculates on the cycle of beauty, destruction, and rebirth. This interactive art exhibit features 35+ creative visionaries of diverse disciplines.

The installation is designed as a model to revitalize otherwise unused spaces in the interim period prior to being demolished and rebuilt. The project consists of eight various size rooms that are divided into two separate units of the duplex with exterior facade and yard. Each room will be curated and transformed by different creative groups and individual artists. Selected artists have no creative limitations and are encouraged to use a variety of mediums to create an immersive art space.

Cherrywood resident Ryan Steglich, who is helping bring this project to life says, "We were inspired by this idea of transforming a soon -to-be demolished building into a playground for artists to do their big crazy ideas, push themselves, and have complete artistic freedom. The artists are excited to be able to work together in a way and on a scale they rarely get to do, and have what they create shared with the community during EAST in a way that invites the community to connect with their own creative energy."

There will be event programming throughout the duration of the project. It will be open to the public in November during EAST (Nov 12-13, 19-20), and the artists are hoping it can serve as a center of grav-

ity and help activate Manor Rd. restaurants and businesses.

The entire duplex will be demolished at the end of 2022, with plans of a new housing project that will include a public mural, sculptural installation and one unit dedicated to affordable housing for the Blackland neighborhood.

This project supports Austin artists and creatives and aims to educate about Blackland CDC, who have been at the forefront of social equality, artistic expression and affordable housing in East Austin since 1983.
